ASOH PAY-IT-FORWARD AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

ASOH Members can volunteer to Pay-It-Forward at other Home Creations and in the ASOH warehouse. ASOH Pay-It-Forward Ambassadors have access to exclusive events and benefits as a part of their contributions.

ASOH SCHOLARSHIP

ASOH Members can apply for a \$18,750 scholarship that includes \$12,500 for educational expenses, \$5,250 for tuition only, and a \$1000 emergency grant. Applications open in Summer 2025. 14 Members are awarded annually.

ASOH SECOND REQUEST PROGRAM

If capacity allows, ASOH Members may be considered for a Second Request for furniture assistance. They must still meet all of the basic eligibility requirements. Reasons for 2nd request include, but are not limited to, fleeing domestic violence, property damage, safety concerns



in the area, moving due to work or school, moving into a larger space, etc.

IF YOU TEST POSITIVE OR HAVE SYMPTOMS

Regardless of your vaccination status or infection history:

- Isolate for at least 5 days
- Sleep and stay in a separate room from those not infected
- Use a separate bathroom if you can
- Wear a mask around others, even at home
- Get tested (antigen preferred) on Day 5
- End isolation on Day 6 if:
 - You test negative, AND
 - Have no fever for 24 hours without taking fever-reducing medication, AND
 - Your other symptoms are gone or going
- End isolation on Day 10 if:
 - You test positive on Day 5 or don't test, AND
 - You have no fever for 24 hours without taking fever-reducing medication
- If you still have a fever, continue to isolate until it's been gone for 24 hours
- After you recover, wear a mask around others for 10 full days after the start of symptoms or your positive test
- For children who test positive:
- Children under 2 can end isolation on Day 6 without a negative test
- Children 2 years and older should follow the steps above for ending isolation

WHAT IS THE COORDINATED ENTRY SYSTEM (CES)

The Coordinated Entry System (CES) facilitates the coordination and management of Los Angeles County's crisis response system's resources that allows users to make data-informed decisions from available information to efficiently and effectively connect people to interventions that will rapidly end their homelessness. CES ensures that the highest need, most vulnerable households in the community are prioritized for services and that the housing and supportive services in the system are used as efficiently and effectively as possible.

WHAT ARE SERVICE PLANNING AREAS (SPAS)

Service Planning Areas (SPAs) Los Angeles County is divided into eight (8) Service Planning Areas (SPAs). Within each SPA, there are multiple Access Points through which a potential or current participant can enroll in or engage with CES. To identify a particular SPA area please see the regional map.

Journey House provides services for former foster youth in housing, education, employment, and independent living counseling. Housing assistance for former foster youth who are in need of stable and adequate housing while enrolled in school or vocational training programs including; finding housing opportunities, securing rental agreements, completing housing program applications and access to furniture, appliances, cookware, linens, etc. from an inventory of donated items. We do not have residential facilities. Educational services to aid former foster youth with the review and selection of schools and/or job training programs to help them prepare for employment with pay structures adequate to move toward self-sufficiency. Employment assistance to help former foster youth with their career search, developing a professional resume, learning interview and job retention skills, and finding appropriate interview and work attire.

Counseling, mentorship and peer support to encourage former foster and probation youth to establish the self-discipline they need to stay in school and create an independent life.

For transitional age youth experiencing homelessness, this 18- to 24-month program offers housing in a home-like, group setting as well as scattered-site apartments. Residents receive guided support and a comprehensive suite of services designed to enable them to become self-sufficient, live independently and successfully navigate a future without homelessness. Youth may self-refer to this program or be matched through the Youth Coordinated Entry System.

Through ongoing classes, they receive employment and education assistance, help with resume building, and a clear direction on where their path will lead.

Clients of the program get matched to therapists based on the clients' preferences regarding the therapists' demographics. Because it is a training center whereby many of the therapists are undergoing supervised training, higher acuity clients (severe addiction,

suicidal ideations, etc) may not be a good fit for their programs. However, they also offer mental health navigation through their Welcome Center, whereby a member of the team can get them connected elsewhere that is best suited for their needs. Their team will handle the screening process.
